Here are just some of the photos taken by the staff over Christmas.

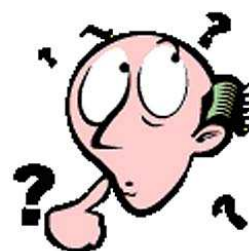


You may remember from the previous newsletter that we had several events lined up. Well, here's the review -
